The Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997 (FPPA) requires all municipalities in Ontario to establish a public education program which must include public education with respect to fire safety. Public fire and life safety education aims to increase awareness about fire prevention and safety to reduce the loss of life and property within the municipality.
